## This month's letter comes from Rev'd Lindsay Hammond

Dear Friends,

On Sunday, 8th June, we will celebrate Pentecost and hear again the story of those early disciples who, after the extraordinary days running from the crucifixion to the ascension - at which point Luke records Jesus' promise to his followers that they would receive the Holy Spirit – finally experience the fruit of that promise. And, lo, the Christian Church is born.



I think over the years we have perhaps not given enough attention to the Holy Spirit, this final part of the puzzle of the Trinity. But, with eyes open, we may well see signs of the Spirit everywhere: at baptisms, weddings, funerals; at every Eucharist and in every blessing; in the kindness towards the dispossessed and homeless; in the doggedness of Christians throughout the world who, through thick and thin, continue to live the gospel; in the lives of Christians in their daily life and work; even in the darkest places of the world, where all hope appears to be lost, caught so poignantly in the inscription on the walls of a Nazi concentration camp in the 1940s:

I believe in the sun even when it is not shining.

I believe in love even when I cannot feel it.

I believe in God, even when he is silent.

In the final analysis the Holy Spirit is, as Jesus promised, the one who helps us, fortifies us, empowers us to continue our Christian journey. The Spirit is our Advocate, our Counsellor, our Comforter, our teacher, the one who sets us apart to act as witnesses to God's unending love and care for the world he has created. The Spirit is perhaps the greatest gift of God to his church, indeed a foundation stone of that church to which it gave birth.

So, we should embrace the Holy Spirit, give thanks for it, and allow it to fill our lives with optimism and hope.

#### Rolvenden Neighbourhood Development Plan

We've had one of those since 2019 and it is valid until 2030. Work started on producing the plan started in 2013. These are documents which come out of a lot of research and asking what people want. Done carefully, that takes time, which is why a group of 12 people have volunteered to form the steering group that will do the heavy lifting of plan production.

'Why' you ask? Because neighbourhood planning gives us an opportunity to shape how our parish develops in the future. Since our current plan was adopted, there have been changes to planning policy at a national level. Also, Ashford Borough Council are starting to review their Local Plan. We can review our Neighbourhood Plan to ensure that our policies are up-to-date and to influence change in the parish. For example, we can set out planning policies on topics including the location of any new housing that Ashford Borough Council requires us to deliver, the type of housing, green spaces we wish to safeguard, community facility priorities and improvements to the promote walking, cycling and riding.


What will be in the plan? The Neighbourhood Plan contains planning policies that are used to help determine planning applications for development within our Parish. It sits alongside the Local Plan for Ashford Borough Council, carrying equal weight in planning decisions.

As we get to work, one of the first things we need is information from as many people as possible covering what is valued about Rolvenden and what is wanted for its future.

#### Rolvenden Primary School



'Vikings and Anglo-Saxons' has been the focus theme for this term in Holly Class. This week the children have been writing recount letters from the perspective of either a Viking or an Anglo-Saxon monk after the battle at Lindisfarne. It is amazing how sophisticated the responses are, the empathy displayed and how the children have made their chosen character come to life. Detail is so well handled.

The children have also been engaged with Standard Attainment Tests. They have worked hard, shown resilience and a very positive attitude throughout the process. The staff are very pleased with the children's responses to the demands made upon them.

Hazel Class have been out and about looking for

natural and found objects, focusing upon mini-beasts. They have discussed their observations and worked at developing their understanding about the life cycle of mini-beasts as well as the pattern of growth and then decay. Patterns have also been part of their programme of activities in mathematics. It is interesting to see how the themes are integrated with the subject areas to create a rich learning experience.

'Travel and transport 'has been the focus of Oak class and they have been studying significant individuals who have contributed to national and international achievements. They have also been discussing change.

Willow's theme is 'Cavemen, Cults and Celts (Stone Age to Iron Age)'. This theme has enabled them to study persuasion and internet safety, encouraging the children to understand that the internet's content is made of opinion, fact and fiction where people endeavour to influence or shape behaviour. There is a great deal of emphasis upon asking the right sort of questions when selecting and organising historical information. These are invaluable life skills.



The school is an incredibly busy place with so many opportunities available for the pupils. As I write this month's review of activities, the school is preparing for the showcase of pupils' skills, a much looked forward to event by the pupils. An announcement has also been made that the end of term play is to be Beauty and the Beast.



#### Easter Caper

The sun shone during the Easter school break and we were able to enjoy a wonderful garden production of William Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream performed by a group of (mostly) local children who attended our CAPER.

We had sixteen children sign up for the 3-day musical workshop this time and it was their first taste of Shakespeare. We decided to use some of the original language and include the best known quotations so Hermia (Daisy Tompsett) did call Helena (Lily Georgetti) a 'painted maypole' and Lysander (Buddy Coggins) did tell his former-love Hermia to 'get you gone, you dwarf!' Demetrius (Seth Gregory) crushed Helena by telling her 'I love thee not, therefore pursue me not'



and Puck (Hazel Pilcher) ended the play reassuring everyone that they 'had but slumbered here, while these visions did appear'.

The children adapted brilliantly to the unfamiliar turns of phrase and quickly understood the humour in the play. As well as the dialogue, we also decided to interject modern pop and rock songs throughout the show to add to the enjoyment. Bottom the Weaver (Betty Thomas) gave a wonderful rendition of 'All by Myself' when he became part-donkey and his friends first deserted him and Titania (Zara Tompsett) sang Lady Gaga's 'Bad Romance' to Oberon following their argument!

It was a delightful mash-up of old and new and a gentle, fun introduction to The Bard. The children's next experience of Shakespeare might be a bit more serious but we hope we have shown them that there is a lot of fun to be discovered just under the surface of his plays.

#### Weather and Nature Notes

It feels April flew by in the blink of an eye, partly as suddenly plants I associate with May started blooming earlier. April was the sunniest on record so it is no surprise it was dry with only 36mm of rainfall, the consolation being that on the couple of occasions it did rain it was in amounts that would be beneficial. May started very warm for the time of year, but the Bank Holiday weekend saw a change in the weather with a chilly northern wind and 2mm of rain. The warmer weather then returned, and as I write, no much needed rain is forecast.

The early warm weather seems to have helped the summer visiting birds and butterflies; a painted lady butterfly was enjoying the sun on the 17th April, I heard my first cuckoo on the 18th, and first nightingale on the 26th although I heard a report of one a few days earlier. Around that time Sylvia informed me the house martins were back in Tenterden on the old library. I saw my first swift of the year flying out from the eaves of the Church on the 2nd of May; the next day I heard the screaming calls of two, and the most I have seen so far is five, hopefully with more to follow.

Last year Ashley started to make a record of when he heard a cuckoo calling, the first was the 26th of April and last on the 13th of June. From the 1st of May he heard them in the distance, mostly early in the morning, nearly every day until the 8th of June. Mid May seemed the time when they called more often at other times of day as well. It is only the male that calls 'cuckoo'. The female's call was described in my old books as 'like water going down a plughole', which having searched for recordings and listened to them is not a good description.



A bubbling chatter seems the modern description and far more accurate. That is what I will listen out for.

I was listening to reed warblers, as I walked along some ditches. Usually I only see fleeting glimpses as they sing and move through the reed stalks, but one moved up into a bush and revealed itself and carried on singing (as photo.) They are known to mimic, and here and there in its warbling, I could definitely pick out short bursts of blue tit, blackbird and house sparrow and a possible 'mew' of a buzzard. It is thought in the bird world the more complicated a male's song, the more appealing he is to a potential mate, so this one should soon have the females flocking.

The nightingale I heard was a nice surprise. In the same area was a little wren who are known for their big voices, also a dunnock and chiffchaff all singing, it was like a sing-off of song birds, very nice to hear. Returning a week later the nightingale had gone, just passing through I suppose, but the other little songsters were still to be heard maintaining their territories.

Hawthorn is ubiquitous, a native hardy plant that is low maintenance and wildlife friendly and makes a feature in spring and autumn. Because of its familiarity it is probably overlooked as garden worthy. May sees it in blossom, and its fragrant white flowers are good for pollinators. I have seen some



beautiful bushes so covered in flowers this year that they look like a generously iced cake, with barely a speck of foliage to be seen, if the pollinators do a good job there should be a good crop of haws in the autumn.

We are rather used to mostly seeing it flailed every year into a neat squared off hedge around the fields and roads, but they make a nice small tree for a garden if allowed to grow. They are also available in pretty pink and reddish pink, single and

double flowered varieties. A species from Mexico, Crataegus Mexicana, has crab apple sized yellow showy haws and has been cross pollinated in the past to make other large-fruited varieties which are very decorative, and I would hope also valuable to wildlife. Along a footpath near the Church is a short hedgerow consisting of white hawthorn and pink and white rugosa roses, a combination which looks pretty at the moment and smells nice, later in the year its hips and haws will make a lovely show too.

  The proceeds are for the Village Hall, apart from Ducks for the Friends of St Peter's, and Tombola and Rhoda's handiwork for St Peter's.





#### FOOD, GLORIOUS FOOD!

#### The Broad Bean



For me one of the most delicious summer vegetables is the broad bean, which I think is often overlooked which is a great shame. They are a very ancient vegetable which has been cultivated for around a staggering eight thousand years. They probably originated in the Middle East and spread across Europe, North Africa and Asia. Like so many foods they would have been introduced here by the Romans. In Ancient Rome they were used to vote in the Senate, white beans meant yes and black no.

It is a staple food in many countries and can be grown in most soils and climates. Although they are called beans, they are in fact a member of the same plant family as peas. They are often planted as cover crops and green manures as they add nitrogen to the soil and are also grown for animal fodder.

Broad beans are an excellent source of carbohydrates and protein, a cup of cooked beans provides about 13 grams of protein, so good news for vegetarians, vegans and anyone wanting to eat less meat. They are full of fibre which we are all encouraged to eat more of. They are a good source of iron, folate, magnesium, also potassium, zinc and vitamin B1, so lots to help support our heart health by reducing blood pressure and cholesterol levels.

If you grow your own and pick them small, you can just top and tail the pod and then they can be boiled whole and eaten with melted butter. Usually by the time they are for sale they are too large and need to be shelled.



Deciding how many beans to buy is always tricky as you don't really know how well filled the pods are, I usually allow about 2kg for six people depending on what else I'm serving. I've often been told that they are too much work to prepare, I disagree and think they are well worth the effort. If you don't want your fingers blackened from the juice in the pods when you are shelling them, wear rubber gloves. If the pods are in good condition, take the best bits and cook to make a soup or purée.

#### To Cook

- boil briefly in a minimum of water,
- drain and run under cold water,
- then slip off their pale outer skins leaving the bright green beans.
- Toss in olive oil, lemon juice, crumble some feta, sprinkle with chopped mint or parsley and you have a simple salad.

It's easy to make a dip, like hummus but with broad beans, served in the same way, makes a good alternative.

I use them a lot either in a risotto or mixed in a pasta dish, bacon, pancetta, mushrooms all go well, add mint or basil if you like.

It used to be mashed avocado on toast, now it's broad beans, top with a poached egg and you have a quick healthy lunch.

I wanted to make the classic salad of tomatoes, avocado and burrito but the avocado I had wasn't up to it, so I substituted broad beans and added lots of mint, it was a variation which was much enjoyed.

Broad bean salads can be made with rice, pasta, orzo, couscous as a base and there's not much you can't match it with. The herbs I use are basil, mint, dill and chives.

The season is relatively short in which to enjoy them, but I think the frozen ones are good especially if you take the trouble to skin them as they tend to be rather tough.

#### Rolvenden Community Orchard

Thousands of trees have been planted across the United Kingdom to mark the Coronation of His Majesty King Charles III with a new government fund launched to celebrate His Majesty's passion for the environment.

The fund will enable local authorities to create green spaces and connect communities with nature as a permanent reminder of the Coronation, whilst helping to meet the Government's targets to treble tree planting rates and ensure that 16.5% of land area is under tree cover by 2050. The projects will create new community orchards and micro woodlands in urban areas.

This tree planting initiative aligns with His Majesty's interest in nature, having held a number of patronages for wildlife and conservation charities during his time serving as the Prince of Wales.

The Rolvenden Community Orchard is a Rolvenden Parish Council initiative on behalf of Ashford Borough Council. A plot of unused land was identified at Rolvenden Allotment Gardens and this was deemed to be perfect for use as a Community Orchard.

Local people were asked if they wished to adopt a tree, plant it and to then be responsible for their tree and the ground surrounding it. 



#### Friends of StPeter's - Mainly about the Ducks



At our last committee meeting, the Friends received a cryptic note from the Special Duck Correspondent urging our Duck Keeper to be vigilant around the Newenden flock. He seems to think we are under threat of penetration by a malign solo duck. He has even managed to obtain a photo. The Duck Keeper assured the committee that, given the distinct colouration of the beak and plumage, the intruder will be very obvious and swiftly ejected. The committee was concerned that expulsion should not mean the duck would be cast adrift on the Rother to fend for itself. Accordingly, the Hon Sec has written to the National Association for the Rehoming of Wayward Ducks.

The NARWD replied: 'The Association recommends that, in the case of a solo duck, the simplest and quickest solution is to advertise locally for a duck-lover with an enclosed bathroom, fitted with a suitable shelf or bath rack for perching, and a minimum bathing regime, with or without luffa, of one deep soak a week. We find older duck-lovers provide the more stable forever homes.

We strongly advise against accepting any would-be applicants who are offering the duck a forever home with the benefit of a garden hot tub.'

#### From Farmers Line to Community Railway?



The Rother Valley Railway had its origins in 1900 when the line ran from Robertsbridge to Rolvenden station and in 1903 on to Tenterden Town. In 1904, the Rother Valley Railway changed its name to the Kent & East Sussex Light Railway. The line from Tenterden to Headcorn opened for business in 1905. The driving force to build a railway along the Rother Valley came from landowners, farmers and businesses in the Northiam and Bodiam area in the late 1890s. They were keen to get their products (mainly agricultural items such as hops and wheat) to markets elsewhere in the country and found road transport unsatisfactory.

Railway revenue did not come solely from transporting goods; 105,000 passengers were carried in 1913, a figure which today's heritage railway achieved again just before Covid lockdown.

However, as roads and vehicles improved, the railway began to lose business and passenger numbers declined. By 1953 a typical week saw only 118 passengers on the ninety trains that ran, some trains ran completely empty. The line closed to passengers in 1954.

Enthusiasts worked to reinstate the line as a heritage railway. The first trains ran between Tenterden and Rolvenden in 1974. The line was restored and extended in stages, reaching Bodiam in 2000. We hope to have the line restored to Robertsbridge by 2027.

Last year, we celebrated fifty years as a heritage railway. In April this year, we celebrated 25 years since the Bodiam reopening. The heritage era contrasts



with the early days of the railway. Before total closure, the railway served local communities by transporting goods to makers markets, and people to work.

The heritage era has seen the railway operate as a tourist business bringing passengers into local communities thus generating increased business revenues and employment at the principal destinations of Bodiam and Tenterden. It is expected that this multiplier effect on local economies will increase when the extension to Robertsbridge is completed and additional business is generated from rail links with London, Hastings and Brighton.

Modern transport thinking is to develop where possible a "Community Railway", a partnership with locally based organisations or volunteer groups. Local communities along the line do their best to support KESR, and many local people volunteer on the railway.


In recent years, KESR has run "Early Bird" trains once a week in August to offer campers and other tourists the opportunity for a day out in Tenterden without the difficulties of parking a car. Many folk see the advantages of taking the train, and numbers have gradually grown.

In 2025, KESR has decided to extend "The Early Bird" service to a two-day service every Wednesday and Saturday in both July and August. It is hoped that communities in Newenden, Northiam, Bodiam, Ewhurst Green and Staplecross might benefit from this extended service. Indeed, we would encourage local residents as well as tourists to see how they can best make use of this service. Northiam Station boasts a large car park for those who live at the other end of this long village and don't fancy a walking option. While Bodiam Station, which has no car parking facility, is blessed with a neighbour opposite, the Hideaway Nursery, which just happens to have a car park that is available for rail passengers.

Our focuses this month: being proactive and fraud prevention.





#### 1. Bank Branch Closure Scam

A potential victim of a bank scam was recently contacted by criminals impersonating their bank. The criminals informed them that they needed to withdraw all their money from their account and transfer it to a new account that had been opened for them, as their old local branch was closing in the next couple of months. Fortunately, the intended victim was prevented from losing their money by

their bank branch staff. Your bank will never request that you transfer your money to a new account that they have set up for you.

if you get an expected call from someone claiming to be from your bank, take their details and end the call. Next, call back using a different phone if available. If another phone is not available, wait five minutes and ring a family member or friend to ensure the line has been disconnected and then ring 159.

Remember our scam awareness message of ABC: Never Assume or never Believe a call is genuine, always Confirm. If you get a call from a company, ring them back via a trusted number and confirm that the offer is genuine.



#### 2. Fake Telephone call impersonating DVLA

Residents have received letters impersonating the DVLA telling them that they need to renew their over 70s driving license. The letter provides a link to go to an online website where it asks for personal information and requests a payment of £78 to renew the license.

Fortunately, the intended victims contacted the DVLA, who confirmed that it was a SCAM.

#### 3. WhatsApp Scam – They want your account

The scam begins when a criminal gets access to another WhatsApp account which has you listed as a contact. The criminal, posing as your friend or someone that is a member of your WhatsApp group, will then send you a seemingly normal messages to try and start a conversation with you. However, around the same time you will receive a text message from WhatsApp with a six-digit code. This is because the criminal has been trying to log-in to



WhatsApp using your mobile number. The criminal will claim that they sent you their code by accident and ask you to help them by sending it to them. Once the criminal has this code, they can log-in to your WhatsApp account and lock you out. The criminal will then use the same tactic with your WhatsApp contacts to steal more accounts and use them to perpetrate fraud.

#### What you need to do

- Set up two-step verification to give an extra layer of protection to your account: Tap Settings > Account > Two-step verification > Enable.
- THINK. CALL. If a family member or friend makes an unusual request on WhatsApp, always call the person to confirm their identity.
- Never share your account's activation code (that is the six digit code you receive via SMS)
- You can report spam messages or block a sender within WhatsApp. Press and hold on the message bubble, select 'Report' and then follow the instructions.

- Grey (household) or Green (recycling)
- Brown (Garden refuse)

You can also download a calendar.

Collection dates do not vary through the year except across the Christmas New Year Holiday season.

Please keep an eye out for neighbours who may not be connected to the web. If neighbours are not getting the bins right have a friendly word and tell them which bins to put out when. 


