

# From the Minister's Desk

Hello everyone!

Well, not long to go now before it's Christmas! Through our Christmas services, we will 'enter' the stable and gaze upon the Holy Child, and we will glimpse how God works, how God is. God has given himself away so completely that we meet him in poverty and weakness, in the frail beauty of a newborn baby, entirely dependent on others for survival.

There is something shocking about this: the Creator of the Universe, of all that is - often referred to in prayer as 'Almighty God' - giving away all strength and power as these are usually understood.



But here God is revealed through the kind of love found in a helpless child in a cradle, and then, in later life, through death on a cross. In a turbulent world we human beings are all too often focussed on our own safety, our own success, on being in control as much as we can. We are used to power being used coercively or corruptly.

But Christmas tells us what Good Friday and Easter also tell us, that God freely chooses to give himself away in love. At Christmas God reaches out to us, ready to be hurt and even to die, so that new love may be born in us, our ordinary habits knocked sideways, as we learn to return that love by allowing it to shape our lives and actions.

God has given us something of his own life, inviting us to be so caught up in the self-giving life of Jesus that we want to live this way ourselves and our society to better reflect what we have seen in him. This means – by what we do, think and say – treating all people with their God-given dignity.

In the manger in Bethlehem, in the frailty of the Christ-child, we see how God is and how God works. It is a wonder, and it is worrying. It is consoling, and it is challenging. Here is the life of all things, full of grace and truth, the life of the everlasting Word of God. This Christmas and subsequently, we are all invited to share in this life, and to kindle on earth, in our local circumstances, in our nation and the wider world, the flame of this incredible, vulnerable, self-giving love.

I wish you a love-filled and peace-filled Christmas.

# Rolvenden Primary School

Glancing at the School's newsletter, it is amazing how much is accomplished every week. This past week involved the student leadership team representing the School at the Remembrance Service, an important occasion for families in the village and across the country.

When I visited Miss Whitlock this week, there were clubs being held in every room. There is such engagement with learning. I was told that geography was the focus for this term and that Holly Class have been studying extreme weather, earthquakes and volcanoes, encountering information about tectonic plates, tsunamis and typhoons; Willow Class has been learning about the water cycle, focusing on lakes, rivers and reservoirs – the key vocabulary is interesting, aptly demonstrating how important vocabulary is in widening knowledge and enabling discussion; Oak Class has been studying Australia, amongst other things, and there is on display some fabulous examples of art made in response to Aboriginal art with all its intricate patterning and narrative. Hazel Class has been engaging with space and finding out about the International Space Station.

As well as all this integrated learning within the carefully plotted curriculum, there are the play rehearsals which will culminate in performances at the end of term. It is all very exciting, but a lot of hard work and enterprise is involved in putting on these productions. It is a huge team effort.

Although this event will have occurred by the time you read this newsletter, it is important to foreground it. The School has arranged a Scholastic Book Fair on the 14 of November which will provide an opportunity for children to immerse themselves in literature, both fiction and non-fiction. There will be workshops and readings. There is also going to be a Zoom meeting with Michael Rosen when he will share some of his poetry through readings, and encourage the children to write their own poetry. There will be further news on this event in the next issue of the magazine with some photographs and reflections.

# A guide to some of the things coming up in and around church

Traditional Carol Services in Newenden (14th Dec, 4pm) and Rolvenden (21st Dec, 6pm)

Sometimes called Nine Lessons and Carols – we hear passages from the Bible that cover the long build up to the main event of the season, the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem and we have the stories so familiar on our Christmas Cards, with the shepherds and the wisemen coming to find the baby. Both services will be followed by some festive hospitality.

# The Christingle Rolvenden (24th Dec, 4pm)

A service for families with the children taking an active part. We learn what we mean when we say Jesus is the Light of the World, using oranges, sweets on cocktail sticks and candles. # **Borough Councillor's Column**



It would be fair to say that the work of a Borough Councillor isn't all larks. I am enjoying my time so far, but some of the meetings can be a bit dry and some of the jargon is impenetrable. There is one group, however, that I am positively excited to join.

The Joint Advisory Committee for the High Weald National Landscape oversees what used to be called the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. It's an area that defies civic boundaries and stretches from Horsham in the west to Tenterden in the east, and from Tonbridge in the north to Hastings to the south. An area defined by small, irregular fields bordered by plentiful small

woodlands, and sunken lanes joining farmsteads and villages. We'll all recognise this landscape because it's the place we call home.

The Joint Advisory Committee (JAC) consists of a representative from each of the civic areas that the High Weald covers as well as people from the farming community, environmental charities and other interest groups. The aim is to preserve and improve the landscape of the High Weald by producing guidelines for development, encouraging environmentally beneficial farming practices and focusing attention on this unique landscape. It also encourages us all to explore the landscape and learn about the internationally important place in which we live.

And it's not just the physical landscapes that we're interested in. Right now, in Rolvenden and Newenden, there is a focus on our Dark Skies. Sue Hatt is coordinating the initiative with the High Weald for Rolvenden and the results will feed into our Neighbourhood Plan. At a meeting on 6th November we learned how to measure light levels in the night sky and that information will then be mapped and added to the High Weald's Dark Sky map. If you see strange goings on at night, please don't reach for the shotgun immediately, it could be your neighbour with a light meter!

Dark skies are really important for the natural world because almost every living thing is adversely affected by light pollution so we all need to do our best to avoid unnecessary lights. From a planning perspective, this might mean limiting the size of windows that pour light into pristine darkness, but on a personal level it might simply mean putting your Christmas lights on a timer, or adding a motion sensor to your security lights.

# Weather and Nature Notes

October weather was changeable and delivered 134mm of much needed rain. Plants continued flowering with renewed vigour, and some appeared to have no intention of stopping like some salvias that are still blooming into their third season of the year. Autumn leaves and glowing berries add to the vibrancy. A couple of lovely late October days where the lowering sun shone brightly and real warmth could be felt from it made it seem almost summery, especially when a visiting clouded yellow butterfly basked in the sun, and a hummingbird hawk moth hovered at flowers, also the ladybirds came out again, and even some lavender plants still flower.

The next day storm Benjamin blew through depositing almost 2" of rain (47mm), and the wind turned colder, a reality check that it is autumn, and we are now back to GMT and longer hours of darkness.

Mild weather returned with the start of November helping the colour to linger and areas of grass and under trees to become a sprawling magical land of fairy toadstools in all shapes and sizes. A misty morning walk, whilst the sun was rising, revealed the movements of a spider population on some vegetation. Their innumerable gossamer threads sparkled in the low sun, and the effect was mesmerising, better than any artificial Christmas fairy light display. I imagine there were literally miles of spider silk strung over the area that would soon become invisible again as the dew disappeared.

The distinct calls of winter migrant Fieldfares alerted me to them. They started to arrive on the 12th of October when I noticed small flocks flying over. (Redwing's calls are a much quieter "seep" and easier missed, but I have heard and seen those too.) When I see these thrushes, it is a signal to start getting the greenhouse ready to accommodate any less hardy plants that may need a little help to get through the colder months. (I like to keep them out as long as



possible but when harsher weather is forecast it is then ready for them to go in.) Another member of the thrush family, the resident Mistle thrush, I have seen this year in the best numbers ever, as nine gathered in a tree around Mounts lane. A few are claiming their favoured holly trees at Maytham to guard the berries from any other birds that may have their eye on them. A bird I have not seen or heard for a few years (I have lost track of how many, so the photo is not a recent one) is the Little Owl, I was pleased to hear the "whill" call of one on my wanderings recently. I used to know of a few regular spots to look and guarantee seeing one (most not in Rolvenden.) I have a bit of a soft spot for them, their grumpy expression puts a smile on my face. Being small their diet

mainly consists of beetles, grasshoppers, worms and moths etc. also small rodents, but they will take small birds mostly at breeding time. They usually hunt from a perch and fly down to it rather than hunting from the air like a barn owl.

I briefly bumped in to Val, our local bat expert, and enquired had bats had a better year as the insect numbers were up? She said the smaller species have done better due to plenty of midges apparently, but the Long-eared bats have not done



so well as they feed on bigger insects like moths. This is an example of how diverse the food web needs to be from the bottom up to cater for all. I still have pipistrelle bats patrolling in my garden in the current warmer conditions, they will hibernate when it becomes colder.

I usually only write about observations from within the village boundaries to keep it relevant to the magazine; however, whilst travelling through Iden after dark recently, making its way along the path and then entering someone's garden was a polecat – or more likely a polecat type ferret. I was taken by surprise and only had a quick look in the car headlights. It would be nice to know if it was a true polecat, but without a close look I cannot be sure. I read that they can be difficult to distinguish, sometimes needing DNA testing to be sure as they can hybridise with ferrets. My search of the internet says they are increasing in numbers in some areas after their decline due to previous persecution as they are now protected. DNA tests on a roadkill specimen in 2004 confirmed a true polecat found in Sussex. I have spoken to people who are sure they have seen one, but I feel, as there have always been people keen on rabbiting with ferrets that sometimes get lost or escape, that the odds of it being a scarce native polecat over an escapee ferret with polecat markings is



slim – but let's hope. I read the main problem with ferrets escaping into the wild is not that they would have a negative impact on wildlife like mink do, as they are in effect filling a natural void that the persecuted polecats left; the problem is, as with domesticated cats interbreeding with true wild cats, the genetic purity is lost. During their mostly nocturnal hunting, polecats unsurprisingly like to eat rabbits, but rats are also a big part of their diet.

The next issue will be out in February, beginning my sixth year of writing, how time flies. Before then there is plenty to occupy me in the garden and hopefully some interesting observations along the way.

# FOOD, GLORIOUS FOOD!

# Chestnuts





One of the winter traditions I love is roasting chestnuts, the smell of them is irresistible and very warming.

Chestnuts were a vital staple across Asia and Europe, they have been an important food source as well as being part of celebrations. Though they are less common in our diets today than rice or potatoes they have a fascinating history, and important nutritional role.

Chestnut trees belong to the beech family and have provided nourishment for thousands of years. There is archaeological evidence that suggests they were consumed in prehistoric times, especially around the temperate forests of southern Europe, the Middle East and East Asia. The tree could adapt to mountainous and marginal soils which made it invaluable to early agriculture.

In the Mediterranean, the ancient Greeks and Romans respected chestnuts as both food source and medicine. The Romans cultivated chestnut orchards across their empire, often grinding the nuts into flour for porridge and bread. Before the widespread cultivation of wheat, in some regions chestnut flour was the primary source of carbohydrate for rural populations.

During the Middle Ages, chestnuts became known as the "bread of the poor". In mountainous parts of France, Spain and Italy, where it



was hard to grow cereal grains, the communities relied on their chestnut groves. In Corsica, villagers used chestnut flour to make soups, cakes and polenta type dishes. These groves, which were often tended like orchards, were vital local economic and cultural assets.

In Asia chestnuts were equally prized. Ancient Chinese texts describe them as one of the "five sacred foods" along with rice, millet, barley and soybeans. Japan also adopted the chestnut incorporating it into Shinto rituals and autumn harvest festivals.

Chestnuts were also found in North America and was once one of the dominant trees in eastern forests. The huge trees provided both timber and food for humans and wildlife. Unfortunately, in the early twentieth century a fungal blight, which was introduced accidentally from imported Asian trees, decimated them. Today there are efforts being made to revive the species.

Chestnuts differ from other nuts in their nutritional makeup. Most nuts are high in fats and calories, chestnuts are uniquely low in fat and high in carbohydrates, more like a grain or tuber. They are a good source of vitamin C which is unusual in nuts. They also contain vitamin B, particularly B6, thiamine and folate, which supports our metabolism and nervous system function. They have potassium, magnesium and copper all essential for maintaining heart and bone health.

Because they are gluten free they are very popular with people with gluten sensitivity or coeliac disease. Chestnut flour is a nutritious alternative to wheat flour in baking; it gives a subtle sweetness and rich smell. The combination of slow-release carbohydrates and fibre gives a low glycaemic index making them suitable for anyone managing blood sugar levels.

Their nutritional values vary slightly depending on the way they are prepared. Roasting, the most common method, reduces their vitamin C level; whereas boiling preserves more vitamins and gives a softer texture. Dried and often ground into flour, they are dense in calories and nutrients but ideal for long term storage.

Chestnuts are used in both savoury and sweet cooking. They pair well with game, poultry and root vegetables and are used in stir fries and stews, they are excellent for stuffings and ideal in vegetarian dishes, I use them in my nut roast.

They are also widely used in cakes, desserts and patisseries, often incorporating dark chocolate which balances the sweetness of the best nuts perfectly.

# The Quality of Starlight

On Thursday, November 6, Sam Nicholas from the High Weald National Landscape came to talk to us about why dark skies are so important and how we can help preserve and improve our cultural heritage. We need light, but we need the right type of light.

'Despite the growth and brightening of the region, the skies of the High Weald are of sufficient quality that much of the rural landscape still lies under dark skies where the Milky Way can clearly be seen. This means that we must protect and strive to enhance them for the benefit of wildlife and people alike. We're working with communities and local authorities to protect the High Weald's dark skies. From celebratory events and educational activities to data gathering to support new planning policies, you can get involved.' (High Weald Natural Landscape)



The first step is to take readings so that we have a baseline to work from. We will be using Sky Quality Meters (SQM) to do this. These readings have to be taken in astronomical darkness when there is little or no cloud cover, away from artificial light, and when the moon is in the right phase – not a full moon or super moon. It takes about twenty minutes for our eyesight to acclimatise to the darkness and we have been advised to work under red torchlight as this light is less intrusive and does not disturb wildlife or dazzle other people. Where the readings are taken is plotted on the map. The more readings we take within the parish, the better the quality of the data. The best time to do these readings is between now and March, when the clocks go forward. Next year, in the same time period, the exercise will be repeated in the same places so that the readings have ground truthing and we hope, as people become more aware of the importance of dark skies, the readings will be better.

Dark skies are important for a number of reasons. It is known that blue light disturbs sleep patterns and impacts on human health, as it impedes the production of melatonin. When we drive at night, the glare from headlights makes it difficult to focus. Animals caught in the glare tend to freeze as the eye cannot adjust quickly enough and this results in fatalities. Plants, animals and



human are adversely affected by the loss of dark skies as normal patterns of behaviour are affected by intrusive lighting.

'There are some simple actions you can take to help reduce light pollution in your corner of the High Weald:

- Light just the area you need
- Shield and point lights down
- Choose less bright bulbs
- Use timers and sensors
- Use warm-white bulbs

An easy way to remember is: Turn it down, Tilt it down, Turn it off!

# Update on the Rolvenden Neighbourhood Development Plan



Work has been continuing on the review of the Rolvenden Neighbourhood Plan. This is being led by a Steering Group comprising local councillors and residents. As a reminder, the Neighbourhood Plan is a document that sets out planning policies which will guide how land is used in the Parish and also help to determine the outcome of any planning applications that come in.

Our original neighbourhood plan was adopted by Ashford Borough Council in 2019. Whilst it covers the period up to 2030, there have been substantial changes to national policy in the meantime. In addition, a new Local Plan for Ashford Borough is being prepared. We are reviewing our neighbourhood plan to make sure that it remains up-to-date and can carry full weight in planning matters. We are making good progress with the Review. In particular, as a result of feedback from the community survey, we are:

- gathering evidence to protect additional green spaces that are special to the community – we've identified a further ten extra spaces to be safeguarded across Rolvenden and Rolvenden Layne;
- working to protect our landscape we already have eleven important viewpoints identified but the community has suggested some additional ones that we are reviewing;
- including a policy to protect against unnecessary light pollution, recognising the importance of our dark skies;
- identifying heritage assets that are important to us locally and building up a record for each;
- looking at ways to protect and enhance our wildlife in line with the Kent and Medway Nature Recovery Strategy.

In our current neighbourhood plan, we allocated three sites for development. Only one of these has been delivered. We do not yet know how many homes Ashford Borough Council might expect our Parish to accommodate as part of the new Local Plan as that detail has yet to be published. What we do know is that our Neighbourhood Plan Review can help guard against speculative development in the future if it includes sites identified by the community as having potential for acceptable development. Therefore, we are looking to carry forward our undelivered sites and are also in discussion with the Borough Council about their plans for land in our Parish that we could also be directly commenting on. Clearly the future of the Moneypenny site will be part of those discussions and we are pleased that residents here are able to remain in their homes.

We will be hosting a community meeting in the new year to talk through our progress. Further information will be provided in due course.

### The Crib


It's one of those oddities of church life that the Nativity scene is known as the crib. Mary, Joseph and babe, shepherds and wise men, sheep, ox and camels are included in that one item which, as the carol assures us, was not actually there. We will sing, 'Away in a manger no crib for his bed'. If you come to the Carol Service, you may well find the crib fully assembled. But that is to ignore the traditional timing. The baby Jesus should be placed reverently into the scene when the Crib is blessed at the 'Midnight' or Christmas Morning Service. And the wise men with camels do not arrive until Twelfth Night. They can be found moving about the church getting a little closer to the stable each day.

In St Mary's after the Carol Service, we will dismantle the crib so that it can be recreated with the help of the children as part of the Christmas Eve Christingle service. Why is it always the smallest child who ends up carrying the camel, quite the largest of the figures?

Amazingly when you come to church on Christmas morning you will find that the wise men and the camel have withdrawn from the stable and will be found inching their way along the front of the choir stalls.

# Flight from Newenden

Recently Peter Comport paid a return visit to the village of his childhood. In St Peter's he found himself talking to the churchwarden who, of course, asked him who he was. Here is the first part of the answer:



Peter, his sister and his parent's formed a lasting bond with Newenden. There are links in the Parish records showing the activities of Peter's Mother and Father in the day-to-day business of the Selmes Trust and Parish Council, acting as trustee and PC secretary. And there are Peter's memories formed by village life in the years before his flight from Newenden to the bright lights and hustle of one of the world's largest airports.

Newenden sits under one of the busiest national routes for air travel. The same skies were the scene-set for one of

the greatest events in aviation history, the "Battle of Britain. It's no coincidence that these two facts served as an early catalyst in setting Peter on a lifetime immersed in the world of international aviation.

Many hours gazing skywards, watching contrails from the last of BOAC's four

engined propeller giant's flying home from Africa and Asia into Heathrow. A Newenden battle of Britain story told by a piece of the famous Merlin engine dug from the Rother's marsh land given to Peter. A stupendous display of the UK's "Cold War deterrent" "Lightning" fighter Jet roaring down the Rother Valley before climbing vertically until out of sight. And memories of a chance to fly from Mr John Cysters grass airstrip across the valley to Lydd for the Lydd Air Show. All these fired a passion for a world surrounded by aircraft.



At 16 years and 2 months, a car journey from the village to digs in Greater London started an adventure almost as bold as the many swallows seen coursing the cricket pitch. Peter recalls the prospect of a career no less daunting to a fresh-faced teenager from a small village.

BOAC, the predecessor to "British Airways", was a huge organisation taking around 150 aeronautical apprentices from many parts of the UK and Commonwealth. Once inducted into the Air Corporations Apprentice School, four years of intense practical and theory, with lots of exams, followed.

Opportunity blossomed in those apprentice years. Peter sat in the flight Deck of BOAC's very own Apprentice Comet aircraft learning how to start/run Jet engines, test autopilots and watch new pilots learn how to take off and land in big Jets. He recalls in his final year learning how to maintain and fly the full



flight simulators used by trainee pilots before they were let loose on the real thing. And training on the new Boeing Jumbo 747, learning how to test aircraft safety systems including the famous "Black Box "recorders.

All this opportunity came on a starting wage of 7 guineas. 5 guineas for board and lodging left just £2 2 shillings for food, and the treat of a train ticket home via Etchingham station. By the time he finished his apprenticeship his wages had doubled to £15 (decimalisation got rid of the shilling!) Peter recalls how apprentices were overseen rigorously by highly qualified engineers. Obtaining indentures is but the first step towards a professional qualification. He learnt aviation follows highly regulated disciplines and rules with both pilots and aircraft engineers licenced by the country's Civil Aviation Authority. Engineers are expected to demonstrate a minimum experience level/time before they are deemed acceptable to apply for the examination which will lead to being able to certify the safety of any aircraft.

Generally, it's accepted that seven years' experience is needed before you can apply to be examined. In that time you must demonstrate in a written record that you are indeed experienced enough to be examined.

Peter explained that studying for this Licence was demanding, especially for the "workhorse" of BOAC's intercontinental fleet, the Boeing 707 jet. The exams were rigorous with multiple written exams on each of the disciplines, be they Instrument / navigation systems, autopilots. Pass-marks were high. If you passed, the next stage was a minimum 3-hour oral examination by a Civil Aviation Authority Examiner. Success meant your recognition by the country's Aviation Authority as a Professional Aeronautical Engineer with full authority to certify airworthiness of your chosen aircraft type.

In the second part of his story we hear how he came to work with the Concord fleet. But for now, here is a photograph of a time when they were all together. It comes with a small detail of the less likely things that can happen when you are responsible for something that stupendous. The caption given reads: The 6 Concordes image was taken on Boxing Day 1989, I got into a bit of bother - behind those aircraft is the A30 which came to halt as cars stopped to see this one- off spectacle. The police rang me via BA security to politely ask if I would put them back in the hangar!



# Rolvenden Parish Council Report



Mark Bawden, Housing Strategy and Partnerships Manager at ABC, has advised the Parish Council that ABC is pausing their plans for the redevelopment of Monypenny while they seek alternative land. ABC now intend to build a replacement for Monypenny elsewhere within the village so that residents can stay in Rolvenden. ABC will then move residents over before they redevelop the Monypenny site. ABC are not sure how long this process will take but have advised that they will continue to

maintain Monypenny, which they believe they can do for some years, which will hopefully give them time to find the land they will need. We are delighted that the residents have received this positive news.

The Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group continue to work hard on updating the Neighbourhood Plan for Rolvenden and hope to have a draft document ready for the spring. Our focus this month is on burglary prevention and online shopping scams

# Summary & recent incidents

Continue to watch for Wildlife Crime: catapulting, riding of e-scooters on roads/pavements, break-in attempts and rural theft. Take photos/videos and report evidence to the police. I spoke at the 16 October 2025 Rolvenden Parish Council meeting regarding a BBC documentary on Catapulting, only twenty-six minutes long, where you can see the scale of the problem. ### 1. Burglary prevention



Most thefts are committed by opportunists who are looking for any weakness they can exploit. Prevention is key. With a few simple measures, you can reduce the chances of your home being targeted.

Do stay vigilant: Be cautious of unexpected cold callers at your door to avoid distraction burglaries. Don't let strangers inside your home, even if they appear to be from a reputable company.

**Security systems:** Consider investing in a home security system. Visible alarm boxes, security cameras and video doorbells can

deter thieves and alert you and your neighbours to suspicious activity.

**Lock up:** Before you leave the house, check that all doors and windows are closed and locked securely, even if you are only going to be out for a short while. Use additional locks and security devices where possible.

**Don't advertise your belongings:** Packaging from expensive purchases should be disposed of sensibly. Leaving packaging outside your home or purchased within view could advertise desirable items at your property.

**Lighting:** Install outdoor lighting to increase visibility around your property. Timer switches on internal lights and radios give the appearance that someone is at home.

**Plan ahead:** Make arrangements for your home to appear occupied when you are away. Cancel regular deliveries and ask a neighbour to check your letterbox remains clear. Consider letting a neighbour park on your driveway or outside your house.



### 2. Online shopping scams



As we get closer to Christmas, criminals will be active with these types of scams. To protect yourself, here are some tips:

Verify the legitimacy of the retailer: research online shops to check they are legitimate especially if it is a store you haven't used before.

Use a credit card for payments: Credit card payments offer more protection than debit card payments.

**Secure your email account:** use a strong password to protect against phishing attacks.

Be cautious with links in emails and texts: Avoid

clicking on links in suspicious emails or texts

**Use strong passwords:** Create unique passwords for each online account to protect against breaches.

By following these tips, you can significantly reduce your vulnerability to online shopping scams and enjoy a safer online shopping experience.






